Eric Sun (5th) and Lauren Grohowski (1st) both made strides with three perfects apiece, but they look to have only a small chance at challenging for 3rd place.

With one quarter to go and Kill Drills still to come, 54 out of 109's 102 citizens (about 53%) this year have at least one perfect Skill Drill.

Saroja Erabelli's record 1020, set in 2011, still stands.

Immediately following the Pi Contest, 109 hosted the firstever P-1 Contest. In this contest, all participants in unison recite: "P1, P2, P3 ..." until one makes an error, laughs or decides the contest is a waste of time (which it is). Those with the best shot at winning are people who: 1) can count 2) have strong determination and 3) don't mind wasting time. The inaugural winner of the Longfellow P-1 Contest was William Sun with a score of P-235.

The next day, Yin and Sun had the privilege of carrying the All-purpose trophy.
