Sixth Graders Sway 2nd Period Elections

The 6th grade voting bloc has never been a force until 2022-23. On election day for 2nd quarter offices, Evan Li became the fourth sixth-grader in 109 history to become Datemaster, the others being Seungin Sohn, Owen Rollins, and Joshua Massery.
