After weeks of hawkish messages and bravado from the upstart R.A.S.P., it seems the 210 paramilitary has decided to err on the side of caution.

Now that breaking Adam Ardeishar's record of 21 perfects is mathematically unreachable, the question is who will be Skill Drills champion this year. Joshua Gong or Wonsup Song?

The pair opened up a twoperfect lead on Jonathan Tseng and Theo Ma, the only two who have a realistic shot at catching either of them. Justin Feng has 7, and a host of others sit at 5.

Tseng, Song and Gong all scored four perfects this quarter which prevented Tseng from gaining ground. James Veccia, Justin Feng, and Tiffany Parise all scored three, but Veccia and Parise are out of the running. At the end of 2nd quarter, Theo Ma was tied with Gong, but Ma disappointingly scored only two perfects third quarter. The tough luck prize goes to Andrew Li who scored 95/100 on five of the six Skil Drills this quarter.

Considering that 4th quarter traditionally has the least number of Skill Drill weeks of the four quarters, Ardeishar's record is safe. Even Skill Drills for the Masses will not help Gong and Song reach 21.

Suspicious Activity Near One Donut Site

109 investigators are now scouring the site of the One Donut for evidence of trespassing. The initial theories is that RASP has been digging around for the One Donut.
