109 Awards To Go On with Changes

Despite facing pressure from several members of the Board of Trustees of the 109 Awards Commission, K109 decided to go ahead with the 109 Awards.

Some board members cited unusual circumstances during the Fourth Darkness such as the lack of award presenters, lack of evidence to base votes for nominees, and the difficulty of delivering prizes to those citizens who are still at home.

In the end, Mr. Huang decided there was enough evidence to come up with lists of nominees and vote on. However, there will certainly be changes to this year's 109 awards.

There was no voting committee in each period. Instead, each entire period was allowed to vote electronically. There will be no guest presenters. Instead, Mr. Huang will present all the awards and prizes. There will also be no presentation of Best Penmanship this year.

In a normal year, 109 awards are presented by the winners of the awards from the previous year. In addition, Mr. Huang chooses a small committee from each period to vote on his list of nominees for each category.

Park Ends Tumultuous Tenure

Late in the 3rd Quarter, when Colin Park was voted 3rd period's first flagbearer of the year, Park thought he would be the flagbearer for the rest of the year. That didn't happen.

In a year of firsts and bizarre adaptations to the Dark Cloud known as the 4th Darkness, Park was replaced by Jamie Hosken after a second flagbearer vote less than three weeks after Park was elected.

Park was voted in as Flagbearer when he was the only one present in 209. The possibility of a second vote arose when more citizens in 3rd period became physically present in 209 after Park had been flagbearer for two weeks (and carried the flag during one fire drill). Hosken won the second vote handily, and Park did not dispute the outcome.

ing piece to 109 normalcy is the lack of flagbearers. No flagbearers were elected for 1st, 2nd, and 3rd quarters. There will be no Datemaster this year. Mr. Huang did not appoint a new Attorney General, so last year's AG, Ryan McKenzie has stayed in that position. Moreover, this issue of the 109 Times will be the only issue of the year, the first time in its 15 year history that the 109 Times did not publish at least three issues in a year (last year's 4th issue was also cut due to the Dark Cloud).

"I feel very sad for this generation," said Mr. Huang. "They will never have the same experience that their predecessors had. Since we

didn't have flagbearers for a long time, some of them don't even know the national anthem."

Due to the reduced number of days, The Skill Drills Cup was cancelled for the first time in 109 history. The most high profile K109 competition was lost to an entire generation.

The end of year committee is scrambling to preserve end of year traditions as best they can. The class pictures, 109 March, and 109 Awards will be tricky undertakings given the restrictions put on all nations in Longfellow.

The one bright spot will be the first screening of *Mangos and Large Potatoes* after its debut on YouTube. Prior to this year, only owners of the physical DVD had access to the film.
