Raptis Falls Into Tie With Li and Hou for Skill Drill Cup

Based on her consistency throughout the year, all the predictors thought Delaney Raptis had the Skill Drills Cup all wrapped up when the 4th quarter started, but then, the unthinkable happened.

On the last day of the year, Raptis missed #4 while Yeeyung Li of 1st period and Sophia Hou of 5th each scored a perfect 5 to put him themselves a tie with Raptis for first place with 18 perfects out of 21 for the year, the first time since 2015 that the Skill Drills Cup has ended in a tie.

As of now, K109 plans to continue the modified Skill Drill format as long as block scheduling sticks around.

nals in 2016. Losing in the finals again in 2021. Numerous quiz bowl legends like Jonathan Leidenheimer, Tajin Rogers, Justin Young, and Deven Hagen as well as respected captains like Kate Salamido, William Wang, and Rachel Trainer have come through Longfellow, but none were able to win the big trophy until this year's Longfellow A composed of captain Aarushi Kanigicherla, Anthony Zhao, Edward Burros, and Sarah Trainer did it.

"This was the hardest working team I've ever had," said Mr. Huang. "I've had teams that probably should have won it all, but this one, based on determination alone, really deserved it."

Longfellow B composed of captain Eddie Lin, Alan Tang, Sohpia Guo, and Sam Cohen tied for 5th, a monumental feat for a B team. At the conclusion of the finals, they ran out to celebrate with their friends and sparring partners, the A team.

"That B team is amazing," said Mr. Huang. "A team wouldn't be as good as they are without B team pushing them in practices."

Mr. Huang says that this year's A team is the best he's ever had. Aarushi Kanigicherla is the younger sister of Vishal Kanigicherla, former Longfellow QBer and captain of TJ A last year. Her calm demeanor and focus made her the obvious choice to be captain. Anthony Zhao was the only member to have attended MSNCT last year under captain Deven Hagen. Zhao, a history specialist, led Longfellow in power percentage with an impressive 70%. Edward Burros, a history bee veteran, transferred to Longfellow this year, and it's fortunate that he did, since he powered the second to last tossup to shut the door on Chenery. Like Kanigicherla, Sarah Trainer also comes from a quiz bowling family. Her sister Rachel Trainer captained Longfellow A to 5th place in 2018. Sarah was the jack-of-alltrades charged with filling in the gaps in fine arts, science, literature, and philately.

"We may never have another team like this one," said Mr. Huang.
