### 109 Exchange Opens Sluggishly

After resisting calls for a systemized Kingdom of 109 market economy, Mr. Huang finally relented this year, and the 109 Exchange was born.

Still having no currency of its own, 109 has preserved the barter-exchange nature of its economically primitive past by offering 109 merchandise for cash from various countries, school supplies, tissue boxes or gummy products. Market prices are reevaluated each week based on Mr. Huang's demand, so buyers need to be attentive to the price list.

As of November 7, a 109 sticker goes for 25 cents, 1
