New Skill Drills Schedule Under Way

Due to the new block scheduling, K109 has had to make alterations to Skill Drills, alterations that may become permanent.

Gone are the days when all periods met five days a week, so gone are the days when 109ers took Skill Drills four days a week, Tuesday through Friday. Since periods only meet at most three times a week, Mr. Huang decided to make one full Skill Drill out of ten questions instead of the usual 20. Plus, he also decided to have one set of five practice problems, also something that has never existed until this year.

"The Fourth Darkness negatively affected everyone's mastery of material last year," said Mr. Huang. "We thought it only fair to use one set as a practice set.
